The compensation package will be determined by professional preparation, experience, and vision, as well as other qualifications. In compliance with Utah law, superintendents receive two-year contracts.

The Application Procedure

To be considered for this position, an applicant's file must be completed and received by March 29, 2012, and must contain:

- A formal letter indicating your desire to be considered a candidate for the position of Superintendent of Schools of Provo School District.
- 2. A Superintendent Application Form completed in full. This form is available of the Utah School Boards Association (USBA) website at *usba.cc*.
- A complete set of current transcripts and any other credentials from universities from which you were awarded degrees.
- Letters of recommendation addressing your professional qualifications and attributes.
- 5. A current vita sheet or résumé, and, if available, a listing of your accomplishments as a leader in education or otherwise.
- 6. A maximum two-page essay explaining how you would apply the Guiding Principles and Strategic Imperatives of the 20/20 Initiative in leading Provo School District. This essay should include your personal and professional philosophy and/or vision of leadership.
- 7. A copy of administrative certifications and licenses, if any.

The District

DEMOGRAPHICS

The Provo School District was established in 1898. It covers the entire City of Provo, Utah, approximately 41 square miles, and has the unique opportunities that come with being a single-city district. The population of Provo was estimated by the 2010 Census at 112,488, with 19% of the homes having school aged children. The District has a stable enrollment of over 13,000 students in kindergarten through twelfth grade. There are 724 teachers and 142 full-time classified support personnel working in Provo's 13 elementary schools, 2 middle schools, 2 traditional high schools and an alternative high school. The District also serves qualified students (ages 3-5) in a special needs preschool and older students in adult education classes.

STUDENT ENGAGEMENT AND LEARNING

Provo School District's mission is to cultivate highly effective learning environments where all students engage, think and learn in order to contribute, create and innovate for a lifetime.

The 20/20 Initiative seeks to implement and carry out this mission. Specific programs have been created and implemented to ensure each student is learning at his or her highest potential, and teachers are working collaboratively to provide optimum learning opportunities for students in all grade levels and subject areas.

The District's teachers and staff are dedicated to engaging, teaching and nurturing Provo's students. Many have received additional endorsements, including English Language Learning, math, gifted education and numerous others. Professional Learning Communities (PLCs) are actively integrated at every grade-level and department as faculties meet weekly to discuss how to best foster learning and growth for all students.

Dual Language Immersion is a bright spot in Provo School District. Offerings include Mandarin Chinese, French, Spanish and German (Utah's first) immersion program. Students, beginning in the first grade, learn half of their school material in the second language. By the time they exit sixth grade, students will be fluent in the language. This program is available at five elementary schools in Provo and is often taught by native speakers of the language.

Provo School District takes great care to provide the best teaching and instruction for each student regardless of the current level of learning. Each school provides special instruction for gifted students and a special magnet school is available for profoundly gifted students in the fourth through twelfth grades. Concurrent Enrollment, Advanced Placement and International Baccalaureate programs are available at the high school level, preparing students to be ready and competitive in a rigorous university atmosphere.

The Special Education Team is known for its ability to reach students with disabilities that range from mild to severe, as well as those that are medically fragile.

ENGAGING THE COMMUNITY

Every school in the Provo School District has an elected Community Council that helps in developing student achievement plans, addresses safety concerns, and advises the Board of Education on boundary changes, school calendars and some financial decisions.

The Provo School District Foundation is a nonprofit 501(c)(3) entity run by the District and members of the community. Business owners, parents, city representatives and school district employees work together to garner support and funds that provide additional learning opportunities for Provo's students. The Foundation's hallmark event, the Easter Basket Auction, has consistently raised over \$100,000 for Provo Schools.

FINANCIAL DATA

Provo School District is widely recognized as being a financially healthy, well-run and transparent district. This year's budgeted revenues are \$109 million, with \$99,000,000 in net assets. During the recent recession that decreased state funding by 15% and cut \$8.4 million from the budget, the District was able to maintain stable fund balances without cutting the most vital services to children, raising taxes or dismissing employees. The district closed last fiscal year with a general operating fund balance of \$26

million which will allow the district to move forward aggressively in spite of the recession.

The District's most recent master plan replaced 3 elementary schools and completed 4 major renovations and additions, along with numerous minor renovations.

For a number of consecutive years the District has earned numerous GFOA and ASBO Certificates of Excellence in financial and budget reporting.

The Community

LOCATION AND CULTURE

Provo is the third largest city in Utah and is located about 43 miles (69 km) south of Salt Lake City along the Wasatch Front. The city has been a focus area for technology development in Utah and is economically vibrant.

Provo has a rich heritage of education and families. Comprised of strong and safe neighborhoods, Provo has a small town feel with the benefits of a larger city. The citizens of Provo are engaged in the world around them and strive to make a positive difference. A large pool of business leaders, researchers, educators and others contribute to an excellent quality of life.

Provo received national attention when the city was ranked first for volunteerism in 2008 by the Corporation for National and Community Service, second for business and careers by *Forbes* in 2010 and fourth in heath and well-being by the Gallup-Healthways Well-Being Index in 2010.

In 2009 Provo was listed in *Where to Retire* magazine as an "enticing city for new careers." Provo was also listed in *National Geographic Adventure Magazine's* "where to live and play" as a cultural hub.

COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES

The city is home to Brigham Young University (BYU), one of the largest private higher education institutions in the United States, which is operated by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. Among many outstanding programs, BYU is known for its top-ranked accounting program and business school. Utah Valley University is found next door in Orem, Utah and currently has the highest enrollment of any public university in Utah. Being near these two institutions provides many academic and cultural opportunities and resources for Provo's schools and students.

RECREATION

Provo City has over 40 parks and 33 miles of trails for residents to enjoy. The city is also home to the Peaks Ice Arena, which served as a venue for the Salt Lake City Winter Olympics in 2002. Provo is located within minutes of Provo Canyon and Sundance Ski Resort and less than a half-day's drive from fifteen national parks, monuments, and recreation areas, including Canyonlands, Arches, Bryce and Zion National Parks.

Hiking and mountain biking trails of varying degrees and difficulty are found close by, as are numerous reservoirs for a variety of water sports. Lake Powell, in southern Utah, is also a very popular boating destination.
