In Davis School District there are more than 1,400 children experiencing homelessness, 300 which are high school students. These children live in cars, abandoned buildings, storage units, or couch surf every night. They may be on their own, with school acting as the only place they can obtain food and safety from the elements. Often, they do not have a place to shower, wash their clothes, or attend to basic hygiene needs.

The Davis Education Foundation has committed to removing these barriers to learning by constructing drop-in centers within our high schools. Currently, there are six operational centers in our high schools with three more scheduled to open fall of 2023. The "one-stop" centers provide essential services (showers, laundry, interventions, and food assistance) to students experiencing crisis. We know if we can keep students in school, we can equip them with lifelong skills as they are transitioning to adulthood that will disrupt cycles of chronic homelessness and poverty. Our discussion will include essential components of the project, stakeholders, timelines, partnerships, and strategies that have assisted in our successful implementation.

## **THE DIGNITY INDEX** Wyoming Room

Presented by Tamy Pyfer Facilitator:

The Dignity Index is part of a national initiative to reduce polarization and promote solidarity across differences, and offers a new way to approach problem-solving in the public square. The Index is an eight-point scale that scores speech along a continuum from contempt to dignity, focusing attention on the language used in conflict, and not the people behind it.

The Dignity Index was recently piloted in Utah, in partnership with the University of Utah, the Hinckley Institute of Politics, and the Kem C. Gardner Institute. Although designed primarily to measure political speech of Utah's federal senate and congressional races, numerous businesses, civic, and community organizations have embraced the Index as a framework for their own culture and organizational communications. Universities have reached out asking for ways to incorporate the Index in their genEd classes, and one high school teacher asked how to bring the Index into his AP government coursework.

This breakout session would introduce school boards and district administration to the Dignity Index, and offer ideas on how to incorporate the Index in their board meetings and interactions with parents and the general public.

## **THE DIGNITY INDEX** Wyoming Room

Presented by Tamy Pyfer Facilitator:

The Dignity Index is part of a national initiative to reduce polarization and promote solidarity across differences, and offers a new way to approach problem-solving in the public square. The Index is an eight-point scale that scores speech along a continuum from contempt to dignity, focusing attention on the language used in conflict, and not the people behind it.

The Dignity Index was recently piloted in Utah, in partnership with the University of Utah, the Hinckley Institute of Politics, and the Kem C. Gardner Institute. Although designed primarily to measure political speech of Utah's federal senate and congressional races, numerous businesses, civic, and community organizations have embraced the Index as a framework for their own culture and organizational communications. Universities have reached out asking for ways to incorporate the Index in their genEd classes, and one high school teacher asked how to bring the Index into his AP government coursework.

This breakout session would introduce school boards and district administration to the Dignity Index, and offer ideas on how to incorporate the Index in their board meetings and interactions with parents and the general public.




